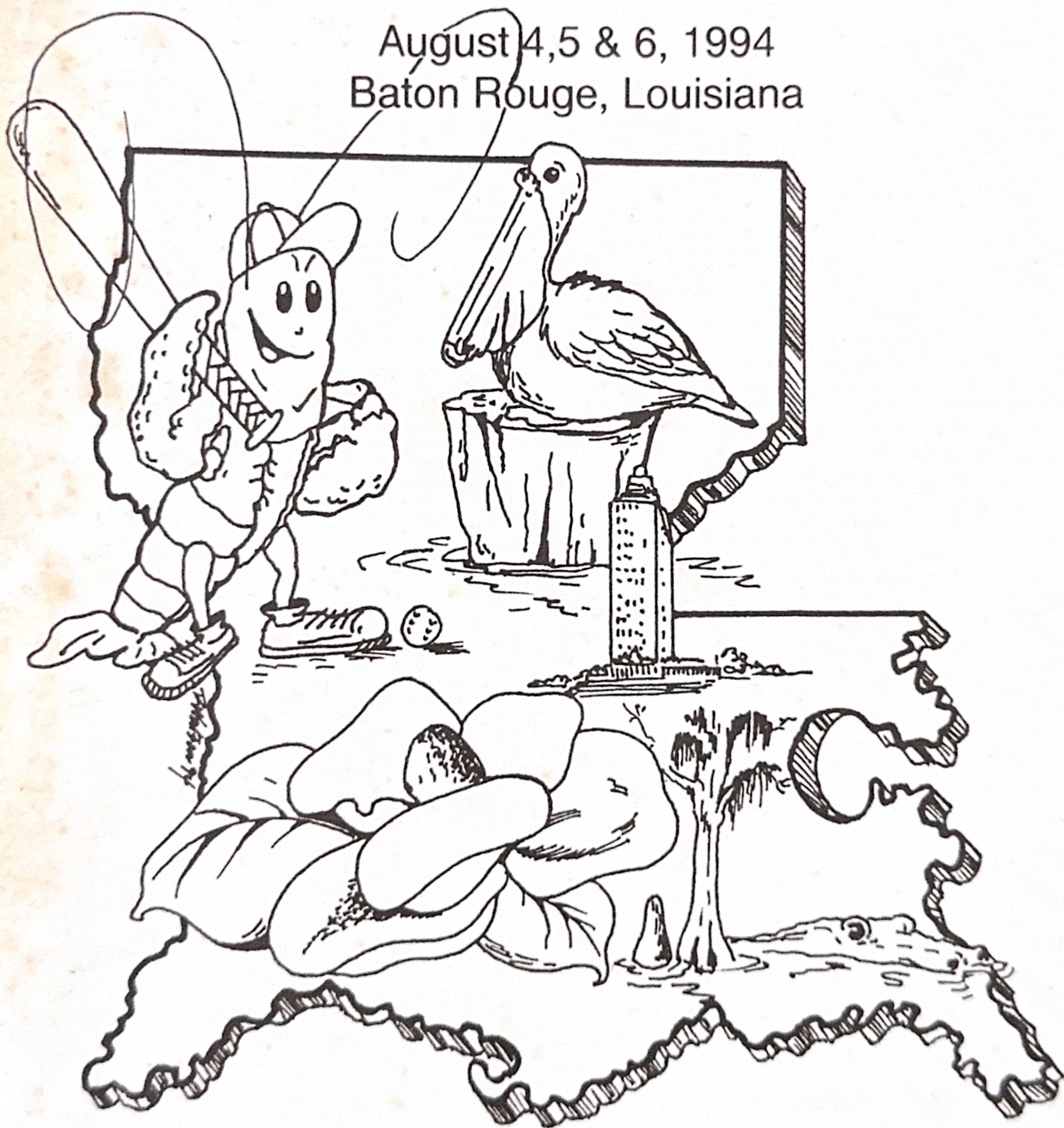

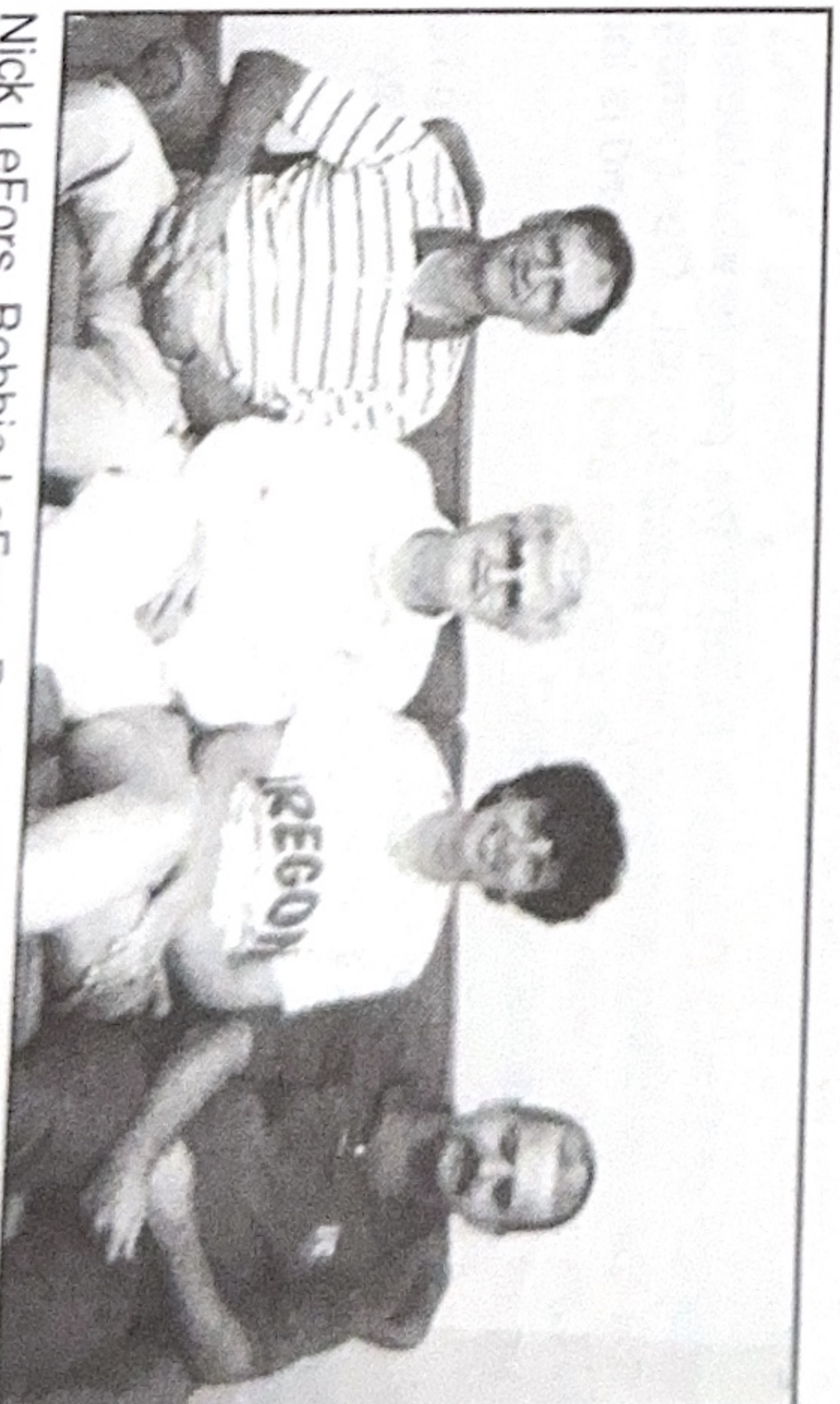

I again welcome you on behalf of the 400,000 citizens whom I am privileged to represent and wish you a successful, memorable gathering in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

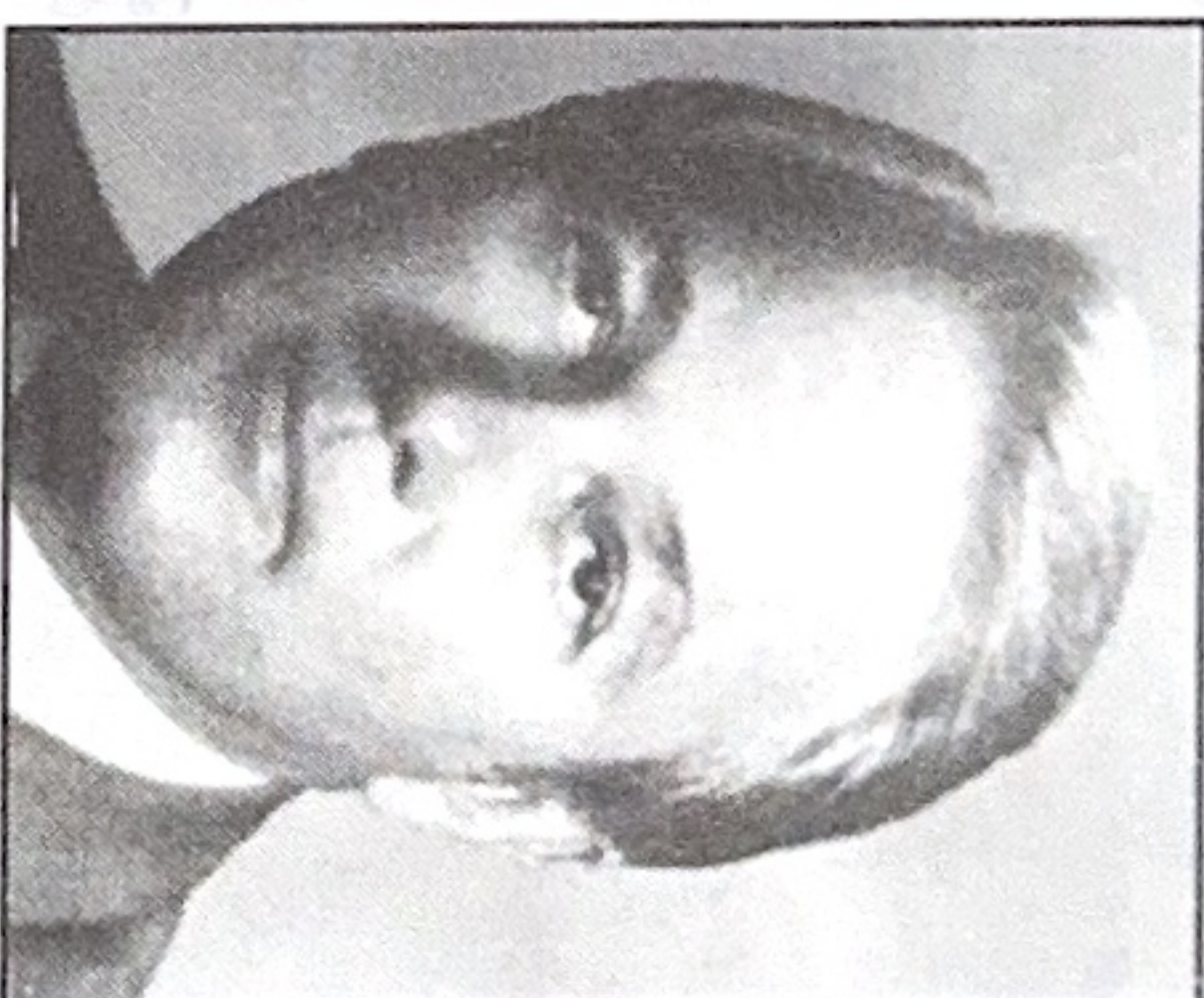

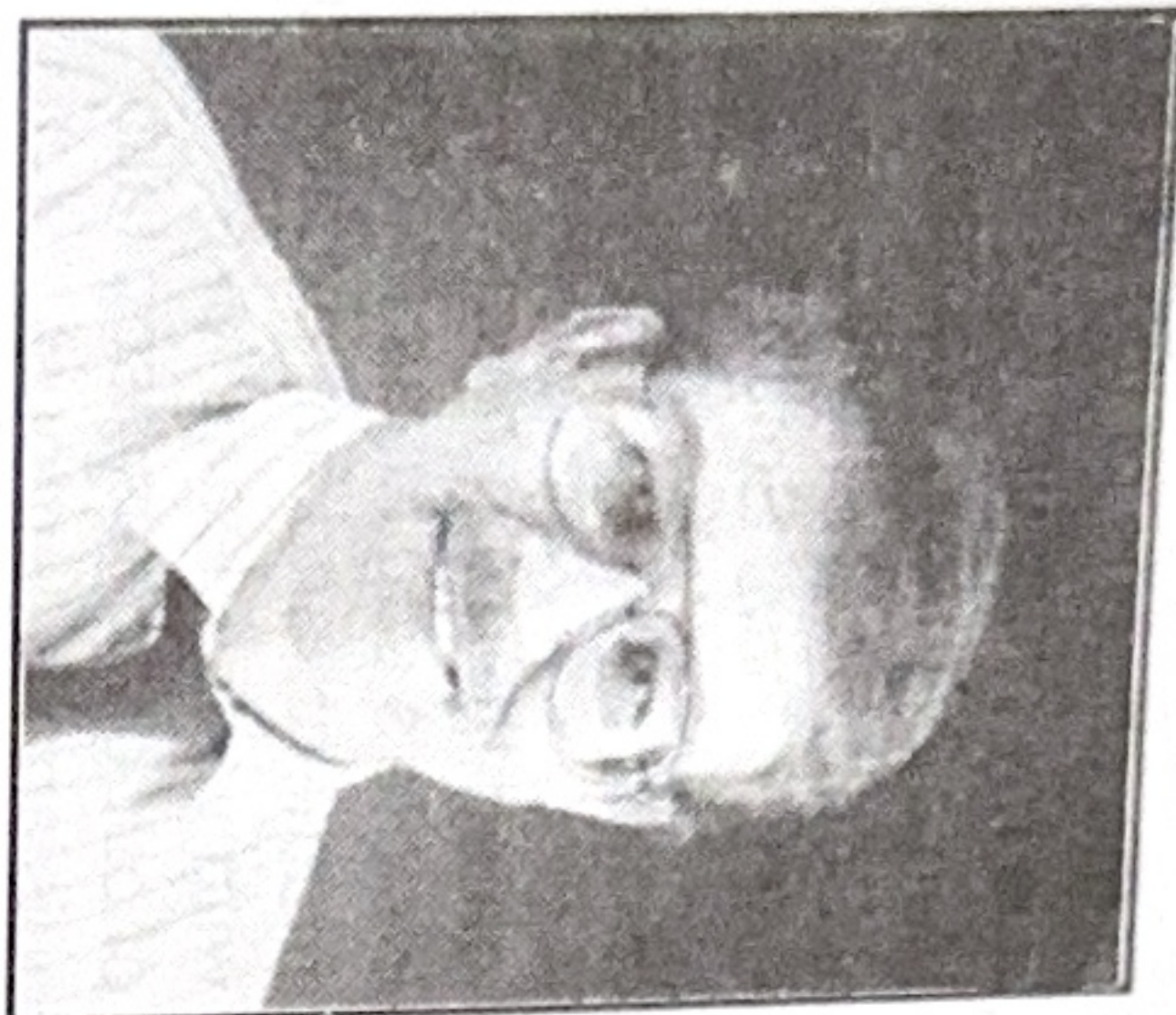

Good luck to all the softball teams for the SWAAD Championship.

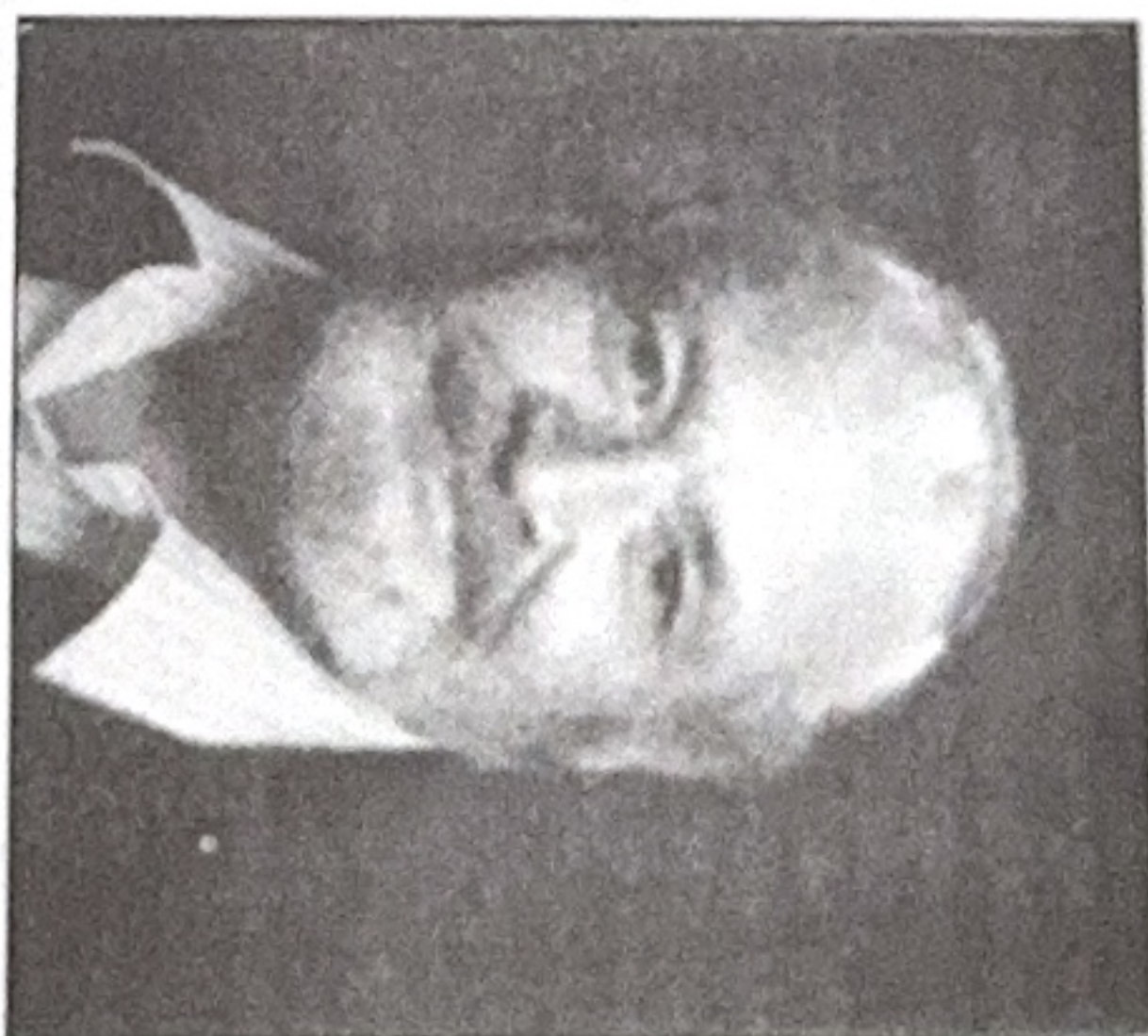

Now let's play ball and have a good time!

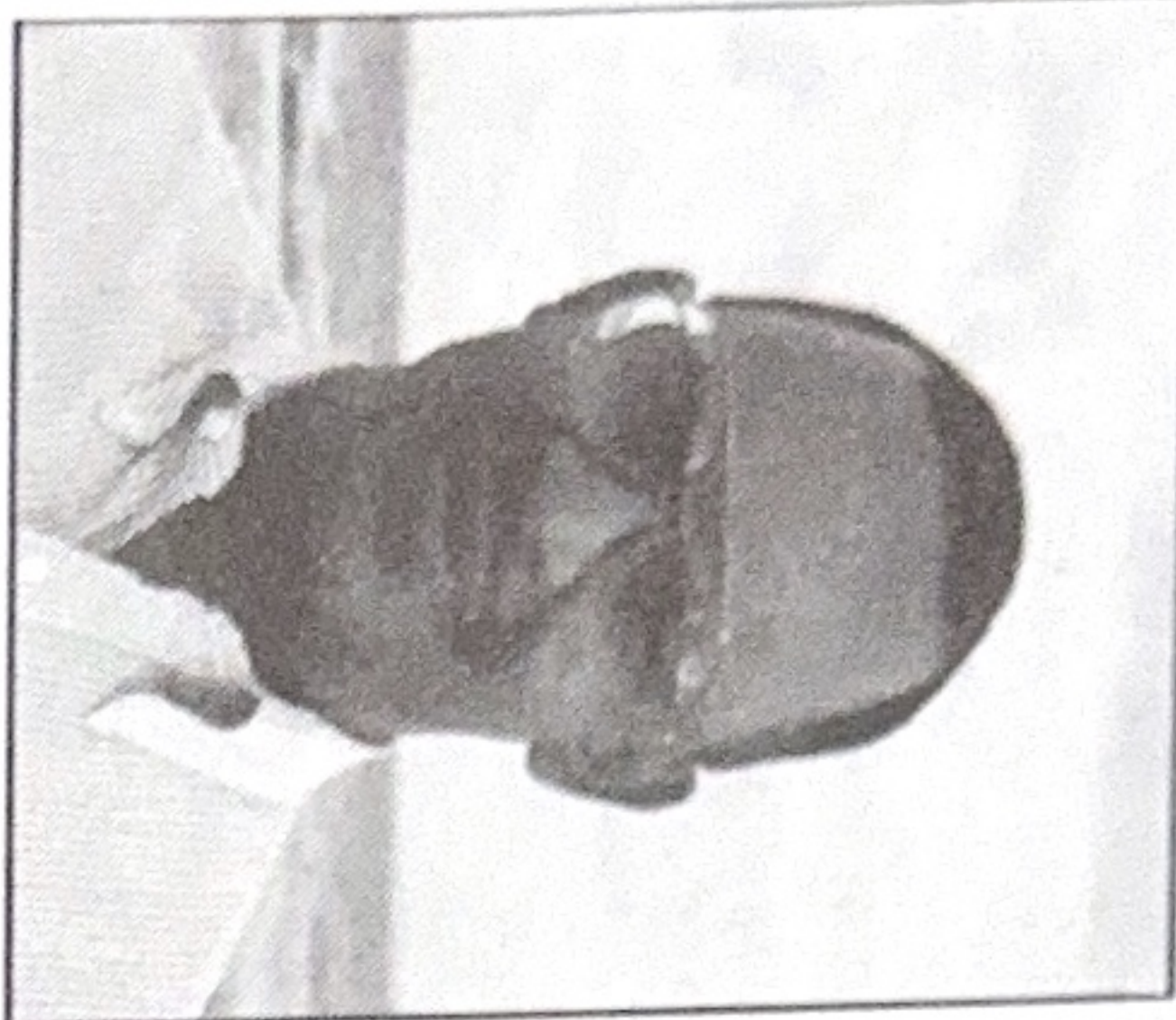

Rita Reneau

Rita Reneau is a resident of Dallas, Texas. She attended the Texas School for the Deaf at Austin, Texas. She played softball for the Houston Association of the Deaf and Dallas Association of the Deaf for 8 years. She was the first coach for Baytown Men's Softball team in 1975. She has been one the best women players at short-stop position. She has played every position in the sport of softball. She was selected on first team, SWAAD All Star six times and Most Valuable Player one time. She played softball in AAAD Invitational Softball tourney four times. She and her team were first team, AAAD All Star three times. She is married to Ken Reneau. She starred and led his team of Dallas to the SWAAD Softball Team Championships often.

Glen Deville

Glen Deville served the Southwest Association of the Deaf in various capacities for a period of 12 years as a player, officer, manager and avid supporter.

He is a coach at the Louisiana School for the Deaf. He was SWAAD Basketball Recorder/Statistician in 1984-85, served as SWAAD Softball Recorder/Statistician from 1986 thru 1988. He also served as SWAAD Women's Softball Recorder/Statistician in 1986.

Glen Deville has achieved success in coaching both softball men and women. He has sent a good number of softballers to the SWAAD tournaments. He has earned the Manager of the Tourney in the SWAAD Women's Softball Tournament one time and the Manager of the Tourney in the SWAAD Men's Softball Tournament. He and his team placed second one time in the Men's Softball Tournament and third two times in the Women's Softball Tournament.

His is still active in coaching for Louisiana School for the Deaf.

Jack Giacona

Jack Giacona is a graduate of Texas School for the Deaf. He earned four letters in football as well as three letters in basketball for his school. He began his player career in the SWAAD Softball Tourney in 1969. The teams he has played for are Houston Texans, Houston Oilers, Houston Astros and Houston Rebels an additional six times.

Jack Giacona came to Austin from Houston where his daughters attended Texas School for the Deaf. He played for Austin Senators three times before he became interested in a coaching career. He and his manager Leon Laster captured the SWAAD Team Championship in 1983.

Jack Giacona turned out a long succession of athletes who distinguished themselves through his tutelage. More than two dozen of his softball players have been on the SWAAD All Stars teams. He also achieved success in managing softball. His team won SWAAD titles in 1991, 1992 and 1993 and placed second two times. During his manager career he has won 20 of 25 games. He holds the SWAAD Team Championship in three straight years – more than any other manager. He was selected Manager of the Tourney in 1993.

He resides in Austin where he is an active member and leader in his club.

Dale Frankenhauser

Dale Frankenhauser, Austin, Texas... One of the greatest deaf softball players to have graced the Texas School for the Deaf and his final playing days with the Austin Angels. Prior to his playing softball with deaf clubs, he played with the Austin Senators, Baytown Rebels and Austin Angels. Now for his feats in the SWAAD where he captured the SWAAD softball team championships for four straight years; seven times earned the SWAAD softball team championships in 1970, 1971, 1972, 1973, 1977, 1983 and 1987. He was selected as Most Valuable Player three times – more than all other players. He also has awards, honors and titles for Most Batting Champion and Most Made All Star Team five times. He also played in leading the tourney in the record, Most Doubles leader in 1972 and 1973 under famous manager, Sammy Lane. He starred as an outfielder and one of the most recognized men players. He represented in the AAAD softball tourneys four times.

He resides in Austin where he has worked as maintenance for Texas School for the Deaf for over 25 years.
